



Year 2: School Closure Work

Maths	Reading	Writing
<p>Number Practise counting in 2s, 5s, 10s, 3s. Practise number bonds to 10, 20 and 100 so that your child knows them at speed. (e.g. 4 and 6, 7 and 3; 14 and 6, 9 and 11; 20 and 80, 40 and 60 etc.)</p> <p>CGP SATs Buster Books I've sent home these books. Children can work through these – don't use them as a 'test', but activities to work through and discuss. They will probably take longer than 10 minutes each!</p> <p>The children have a 'Sumdog' log-in so they can access the website to try out the activities.</p> <p>Telling the time Practise telling the time on a clock with hands. In class we have practised telling the time to o'clock, quarter past, half past and quarter to.</p> <p>Times Tables Try to learn tables regularly. Year 2 should know the 2, 5 and 10 x table off by heart. All children have their TTRockstars log-in. www.timestables.co.uk is an excellent website for learning tables. The children know this website well from school.</p>	<p>Daily Reading Children need to read DAILY please. I've given them a couple more Reading books, but depending on how long our closure is, please use any other reading material you have at home. Make a note of what has been read in the red log book.</p> <p>Reading Comprehension I've sent home CGP 'SATs Buster' Reading comprehension books. The children read the text and answer the questions. Work through these as appropriate.</p> <p>Please read TO your child regularly and share books. Just the usual 'bedtime story' helps!</p>	<p>Children could keep a simple diary whilst they are off school. I appreciate that days may be spent inside, but just a few sentences per day would help. It would also give them practice of writing the date/Days of the week/Months of the Year.</p> <p>You could write some poems – on a subject of your choice (seasons, weather, pets, nature, family... anything that grabs their interest!)</p> <p>Our topic has been 'Toys and Games'. Write about your favourite toy at home. What is it like? Why do you like it?</p> <p>Children could write a set of instructions for something – e.g. how to play a certain game; how to care for a plant; a recipe; cleaning your teeth etc.</p> <p>Children could write a story, with a toy as the main character.</p> <p>I've sent home the CGP SATs Buster books for Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling. You could work through these as appropriate. Again, it isn't realistic for all the children to complete one task in just 10 minutes!</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Our science work is 'Plants'. Find out the names of some plants. Draw a picture of them and label them. • Art – can you sketch or paint some of your favourite toys? • Craft – can you make a model of a robot? Use anything you like – recycled materials etc. Draw your model. • History – can you add your family members onto a timeline or family tree? Next to the person's name, can you draw/write their favourite toy?
