CAR PARK ACCESS UPDATE All parents and carers should have received an important letter via email today about the new car-park access arrangements. Due to increasing safety concerns, we are now limiting entry to the school car park at drop-off and pick-up times.

Only families with an approved Gold, Silver, or Blue Permit will be allowed to use the car park. Permits are available for specific needs and **may** be granted for:

- Children with mobility needs
- Parents/carers with mobility difficulties (for instance Blue Badge holders)
- Temporary medical circumstances (child or parent/carer)
- Exceptional, well-evidenced situations

From the date stated in the letter, drop-off and pick-up in the school car park will not be permitted without a valid permit.

All other families are encouraged to continue using our free Grange car-park permit and the Bepton Road crossing patrol, which offers a safe walking route to school.

If you did not receive the letter or need another copy, please contact the school office.

HAZEL CLASS BRING TITANIC HISTORY TO LIFE AT SEACITY MUSEUM On Wednesday, Hazel Class stepped out of the classroom and into history as they travelled to the **SeaCity Museum in Southampton**, the very city where the RMS *Titanic* began its fateful voyage in 1912. 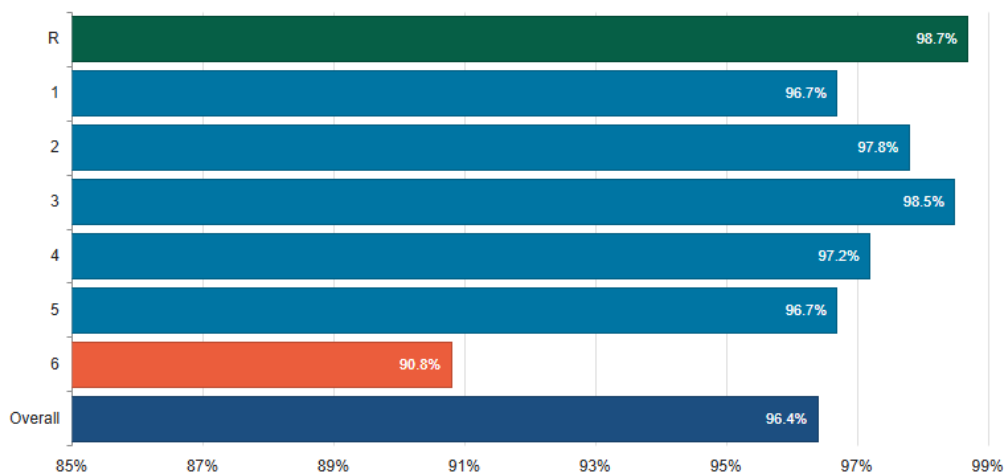

WHY ATTENDANCE MATTERS — AND WHY OUR TARGET IS 95% Good attendance is one of the most important factors in helping students succeed. When pupils are in school regularly, they build strong learning habits, keep up with the curriculum, and feel more connected to their classmates and teachers. Every school day provides valuable opportunities that cannot be fully replaced by catching up later.

Why Attendance Is So Important

- **Learning builds day by day.** Lessons are designed to flow in sequence. Missing even one day can make the next lesson harder, meaning students may spend extra time trying to catch up instead of moving forward confidently.
- **Stronger social ties.** Regular attendance helps pupils form friendships, collaborate in groups, and feel part of the school community.
- **Better long-term outcomes.** Research shows that consistent attendance is linked to higher achievement, stronger progress, and improved wellbeing. It helps set the foundations for good routines that support future study, training, and employment.

Why Our Target Is 95%

Our attendance target of **95%** isn't just a number—it represents the level at which students can fully benefit from their education. At 95%, a pupil still has some flexibility for illness or unforeseen circumstances while remaining engaged in their learning.

To put it in perspective:

- **95% attendance = about 9 days absent across the whole school year.**
- Falling below 90% (often called "persistent absence") means missing almost a month of school each year—equivalent to losing an entire half-term of learning over just two years.

By aiming for at least 95%, we ensure students experience the continuity and stability they need to thrive academically and socially.

How Families Can Support Good Attendance

- Establish a consistent morning routine.
- Book appointments outside school hours whenever possible.
- Encourage pupils to stay committed to school even on days when motivation is low.
- Communicate with us early if your child is experiencing difficulties that affect attending.

Together, by prioritising excellent attendance, we can give every pupil the best chance to learn, grow, and succeed.

More on activities

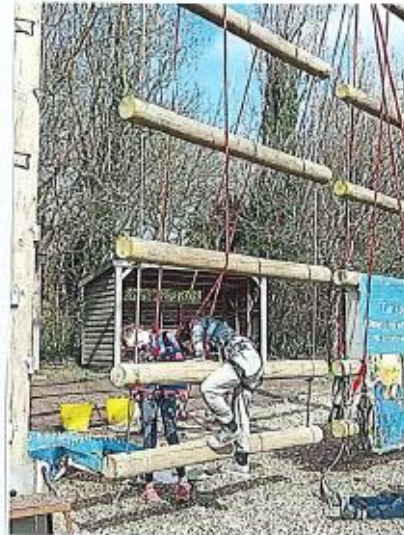
